Dear Friends.

As we approach the seasons of Advent and Christmas, I pray that the real meaning of these seasons will touch our hearts. There is enormous commercial pressure to buy presents, consume and to have the "perfect" Christmas. Yet, when we consider the circumstances how Mary and Joseph travelled to Bethlehem, the first Christmas was so very different. A heavily pregnant Mary - engaged to Joseph, but not vet married - having to make a very difficult and uncomfortable journey from Nazareth to Bethlehem through rugged, dusty terrain. The thought of being unable to find accommodation is bad enough for any traveller today, but for Mary and Joseph this must have been deeply upsetting. When the Roman Emperor decided to hold the census, I doubt that he had given much thought to how the lives of ordinary, real people would have been affected. Modern governments can still be prone to make decisions that negatively affect ordinary people. Yet, in the midst of this human drama, came the birth of a baby who was destined to be the Saviour of the World. This birthday party is indeed a cause for ongoing celebration, yet one where the greatest gifts that we can give Jesus Christ are ones of peace. love and reconciliation.

Looking back on 2011, this has been a momentous year – perhaps best seen in the revolutions which have become known as the "Arab Spring". Libya, Egypt and Tunisia have seen unpopular dictators overthrown, although their replacements are struggling to get to grips with the aftermath. In May, we were blessed with visitors from our twin congregations in India – but in September we learnt of a tragic earthquake. Here, the economic problems have never been far from the headlines. In the midst of so much uncertainty, the words of the prophet Isaiah, in foretelling the coming of Christ, offer hope: "For to us a child is born, to us a son is given, and the government will be on his shoulders. And he will be called Wonderful Counsellor, Mighty God, Everlasting Father, Prince of Peace." (Isaiah 9:6).

Please do come and enjoy the Christmas services in Church. Kristina and I wish you and your family a very happy Christmas and every blessing for 2012. God bless you,

Church of Scotland announces Moderator Designate for 2012

The founder of an international interdenominational charity that helps street children has been chosen to be the next Moderator of the General Assembly of the Church of Scotland.

The Reverend Albert Bogle, minister at St Andrew's Parish Church in Bo'ness, has been nominated Moderator Designate by the Church of Scotland's Committee to Nominate the Moderator of the General Assembly. He was ordained in 1981. He is regarded as an innovator, particularly in using new technology (such as PowerPoint) in worship.

As well as his ministry in Bo'ness, Mr Bogle has served the General Assembly of the Church of Scotland in various roles from 1983 sitting on the Panel of Worship to being convener of the Kirk's "Church without Walls" Planning Group from 2004 to 2009. He is currently a member of the World Mission Future Strategy Group.

The importance of the correlation between local, national and international has had a profound effect on him personally and on his ministry and congregation and it was this that led to Mr Bogle establishing the Vine Trust.

Set up in 1985 the Vine Trust helps some of the poorest children and communities around the world. Currently, the charity's Amazon Hope Project provides a health service for around 100,000 patients every year.

Mr Bogle is married to Martha. The couple have a son and daughter.

Dear Fellow-Member,

I hope that you read this letter very carefully, because it is a personal letter from me, your Minister, to you. Then, when you have read it, I hope you will respond wholeheartedly to its challenge and its appeal.

How much does Cockpen Parish Church mean and matter to you? Have you any real concern about it, and do you really care what happens to it?

In all probability you do at least have a very strong sentimental and emotional attachment to it, for many reasons. Perhaps you or yours were baptized in it: perhaps you were received into the communicant membership of the Church in it: perhaps you or yours were married within its walls: perhaps one or more of your loved one or your friends were laid to rest in the Cemetery around it. In one way or another, you see, it is bound up with all that is most sacred in your home and family life.

Or if you have come into the fellowship of the Congregation by Certificate from some other place, you have perhaps rejoiced in its splendid exterior, its majestic tower, its lovely situation, its worship and its praise.

The Fabric of Cockpen, the Church, the Manse and the Hall, cannot, however, be maintained on sentiment and emotion. The maintenance of that Fabric is costlier than ever, nowadays, and it is not at all likely to become any less so. We really so need your financial support in larger measure than ever before, to enable us to build up to adequate proportions our Fabric Fund which has been completely exhausted by recent heavy and unavoidable expenditure on our buildings.

With this letter there will be delivered to you by your Elder a special envelope into which you are invited to put a special contribution to the Fabric Fund. He will call back for the envelope in about a week. Before you put anything into that envelope consider how much it matters to you whether there will be a Parish Church in Cockpen or not: consider whether or not you want it to remain and to be maintained there in majesty and beauty: and then contribute as largely as you possible can: by doing so you will enable us to keep it, together with the Manse and the Hall, in sound condition, lovely, attractive and worthy. It is not for my sake that this is being asked, but for the sake of Jesus Christ and His Church without whom and without which your life, as you know in your heart of hearts, would be empty and vain.

It is, of course, our wish that all three will enjoy the duties of Eldership, something that I, since 1966, have cherished as have 'the other lifers' and, I know that my fellow Elders will be more than happy to guide them for as long as they need. Again, I welcome all three who I know, will carry out the respective duties with love and diligence.

On a sad note, we mourn in the passing of one of our members, Arthur Mills on 31st October. From a book - 'Facing the Storm'

As you know, I have included a few stories from the above book in previous issues of 'The Link' and would like to share one more with you. I have enjoyed these books so much and would commend them to you. *G.S.*

Mark Ch. 10, v. 13 - 16

Christmas is a cross and a woolly hippopotamus or, so it seemed the other Sunday.

My home Church is housed in a modern building - a Church in the round. The pews are set in three-quarters of a circle and, the focal point is the Communion Table. Usually, a cross, a Bible and a small bowl of flowers stand on the Table - nothing else. For Communion Services, of course, there's bread and wine - simple and uncluttered.

This morning was different, the Table was almost covered, the cross nearly obscured. There were two woolly hippos, several dolls, a family of teddy bears, a furry rabbit, boxes, books and crayons. It was a toy Service, and the toys were gifts from the congregation to a local centre helping children with mental handicap.

On the Table, woolly hippos or, bread and wine? It seemed a incongruous contrast at first sight but, below the superficial difference, I felt a deeper similarity. Both were expressions of love, both made the incarnation a reality. Both pointed to the truth that God cares, that he stands with the weak and vulnerable.

Sometimes theology seems so abstract and remote, yet, the reality of love is simple and concrete and, can be expressed as well in a woolly hippo as in anything else.

Lord, sometimes it seems we try to keep you safe in some old echoing museum of theology. We hold you, treasured but remote. We dust the showcase, occasionally renew the label. Show our respect in regular visits, Sunday by Sunday, the only contact with the world outside the flower arrangements, tastefully done.

But you are Lord of life, not some old image of Victorian conformity. You brim with energy, with the urgency of now. Your word calls me to make contact today. Challenges my preconceptions. Faces me with the world that lies outside the double-glazed and insulated walls of my religion. Confronts me with the call to love, not abstract ideas, but people.

Your cross was wood from a living tree, real blood, real pain. And you call me to follow you into that world. To show my love in ordinary ways, to ordinary people. Help me, Lord, never to lose touch with your reality. Help me to see compassion in a teddy bear, an image of your love, in toys freely given.

Co-incidence?

As she left the stage I stepped forward to thank her and asked her if she was aware of what her fingers had been pointing at when she answered that question She answered no and I pointed out the front of the lectern - where the burning bush appeared with the Latin NEC TAMEN CONSUMEBATUR - and it was not consumed. We shared a knowing look – co-incidence? or one of those very special moments.

During our cruise holiday on board Crown Princess, May and I attended Divine Service on Sunday 11th September, coinciding with the 10th Anniversary of the terrorist attacks in the United States.

The service was taken by an Anglican vicar from USA, a lady minister. We listened to a truly great talk on forgiveness given by a Baptist from Leicestershire. He had been caught up in the terrorist attacks in Madrid and London. He had a most interesting story to tell. He is blind, with a guide dog, and the dog kept pulling him away from the direction of the bus which was blown up on that tragic day.

At 11 a.m. all, irrespective of nationality, observed a minute's silence in memory of those of all faiths who died during the terrible events of 11th September, 10 years ago.

Lasswade and Rosewell Choir

This article is being started in September – before the Autumn Issue of The Link is out - as I see the editors are calling for material for the Christmas Issue to be in their hands by 6th November by which time, all going to plan, Moira and I will be in Singapore. So I felt I had better get this done early.

At the time of writing, the Choir do not know what plans I have for Christmas but, if they agree, one of the items which we shall do will be a setting of the well known carol "In the bleak mid-winter" sung to an arrangement by Richard Lloyd. We actually did this a couple of years ago but it merits an airing again.

The words, which appear in many hymnals and carol books, are based on a poem by Christina Rossetti and can be sung to settings by a variety of composers, including Gustav Holst whose well known tune "Cranham", which is in CH4, is named after the Gloucestershire town. Harold Darke and Richard Lloyd are two other people who have done arrangements for these words and it is the latter's setting which we hope to do at Christmas. The words can also vary between hymnals and carol books. The author, however, brings out very clearly the physical and climatic conditions as she sees it at the time of the Birth. You can hear the frosty wind moaning and experience the earth hard as iron and the frozen water. She then contrasts His second coming – heaven cannot hold him – with the stable place of His birth. While angels throng the air it is only his mother who can worship Him with a kiss. Finally, while shepherds can bring a lamb and wise men do their part, we can give Him our hearts.

Christina Georgina Rossetti was born in London on 5th December 1830 and died there on 29th December 1894. She was educated at home by her mother and in the 1840s the family faced a period of financial difficulties due to the deteriorating physical and mental health of her father. He was diagnosed with bronchitis, possibly tuberculosis and faced losing his sight. He was forced to give up his teaching post at Kings College and suffered from depression and other problems for his remaining eleven years. Christina's mother began teaching to help keep the family out of poverty and with her siblings at work or college Christina's life at home was one of isolation.

Although she, too, suffered from health problems she began writing poems from 1846 and was inspired by her favourite poets and also by narratives from the Bible, folk tales and the lives of the saints.

She undertook voluntary work from 1859-70 at St. Mary Magdalene House and Charity in Highgate, a refuge for former prostitutes. She opposed slavery in the American Deep South, cruelty to animals and the exploitation of girls in under age prostitution.

She died in 1894 from a recurrence of an earlier diagnosis of breast cancer and is buried in Highgate Cemetery in North London.

I have dwelt on only one piece which I hope to do with the Choir but I have several other items in mind. At this moment I do not know which services we shall be invited to sing at but in previous years the "usual suspects" have been the Carol Party at Rosewell and the Christmas Eve service at Lasswade and I assume we shall be at both this year.

I am very conscious that any choral activity would not be possible without the enthusiasm, support and hard work of the ladies and gentlemen who form our choir. To the regular choir who turn out Sunday by Sunday and to those who have augmented our number for special services I express my thanks once again for all your support over the year.

The Choir join me in wishing all our readers and their families the Compliments of the Season.
