

Dear Friends.

Christmas is nearly upon us again. We should reflect on the enormity of the true message of Christmas: the incarnation of Jesus Christ who is the only Son of God, the King and Head of the Church and our Saviour and Lord. It is easy to become cynical about commercialism and the aim to create a "perfect" Christmas, but the circumstances of Jesus' birth in Bethlehem were far from perfect – even culminating with Mary, Joseph and the infant Jesus having to flee from King Herod's soldiers as refugees to Egypt.

Christmas can be difficult time, especially for those who have recently lost a loved one. Such people are in my prayers. My wife suffered a miscarriage this autumn; this has been extremely distressing for both of us. At times of great upset, we ask that age-old question "why" – but despite the pain I believe that God is gracious and loving. The prayers of so many people have been a great help. Prayer is powerful; give thanks for what is good and ask God for help in times of difficult. "He helps us in all our troubles, so that we are able to help others who have all kinds of troubles, using the same help that we ourselves have received from God." (2 Corinthians 1:4)

The Christmas service times were published in the Harvest edition of "The Link" magazine; please note that the Service of Nine Lessons & Carols by candlelight at Cockpen Church will now be on Sunday 23^{rd} December at 7pm (<u>not</u> 16^{th}). The Nativity Play services will be at 10 am at Lasswade on Sunday 16^{th} December and 11.30 am at Cockpen on Sunday 23^{rd} December. The Christmas Eve Carol services will be at 4pm at Rosewell, 7pm at Lasswade and 11.20pm at Cockpen.

I encourage you to please come regularly to worship on Sundays. Worship and prayer are vital parts of our lives as Christians. Kristina and I wish you and your family a very Happy Christmas and prayerful good wishes for 2013.

Moderator for 2013-2014 announced



The Reverend Lorna Hood, minister at the North Parish Church in Renfrew, has been nominated to be the next Moderator of the General Assembly of the Church of Scotland. Mrs Hood will take up the office of Moderator on Saturday 18th May 2013 on the opening day of the General Assembly of the Church of Scotland.

Mrs Hood was born in Irvine, Ayrshire, in 1953. She was educated at Kilmarnock Academy and the University of Glasgow graduating with an MA in 1974 and BD (Honours) in 1977.

She began her church career as a probationer assistant at St Ninian's Church in Corstorphine, Edinburgh and was ordained there in April 1978. In 1979 Mrs Hood was called to Renfrew North Parish Church where she has served for the last 33 years. She was also appointed a Queen's Chaplain in 2008.

For 22 years she served as chaplain in the Royal Alexandra Hospital in Paisley where she was responsible for the Women's & Children's Directorate and was part of a team which pioneered the care plan for those who had suffered loss during pregnancy or shortly after with an annual memorial service. For this work they were awarded in 1992 the Association of British Insurers Medical Community Award. Mrs Hood has also been actively involved with the local hospice ACCORD speaking at fundraising events and dinners and supporting staff and patients when called upon.

Mrs Hood has served on various committees in the Church of Scotland. In 2001 she was appointed a General Trustee and is presently Vice Convener of the Assembly Arrangements Committee and Vice Convener of the Business Committee of the General Assembly.

In 2011 she completed her training for the Church of Scotland's mediation project, "A Place for Hope" and has served in various capacities, including at present a group set up to consider the theology of mediation and reconciliation.

Mrs Hood married her husband Peter in 1979 and the couple have two children, Laura and Peter.

Lasswade's Former Missionary Partner

Many of you will remember Catherine Nicol who was our missionary partner in Pakistan until 2001 when she retired after 40 years of working there with girls and young women. She came back to Scotland then but couldn't settle so returned to Pakistan where she is still helping people. When she was on leave, she came to church and to Lasswade Guild to tell us about her work.

Now she is to receive the Tamgha–e-Quaid-e-Azam, or medal of the Great Leader, a civil award conferred by the Government of Pakistan on those who have attained academic distinction in the fields of science, arts, literature, or distinction in the fields of sports and nursing; or for rendering dedicated services with selfless devotion in human rights and public services. Awards are announced on August 14th (Independence Day) every year and the investiture takes place on March 23rd the following year (Pakistan Day).

If you get 'Life and Work' you will already have seen this but for those who do not see the magazine, the following is taken from it.

Andrew McLellan, Convenor of the Church of Scotland's World Mission Council, visited Pakistan in 2011 and met Catherine. He said: "She lives in a girls' hostel, St Columba's RTC. I sat at her table and watched an unstoppable flow of people coming in and out all day with problems, questions and requests.

"These were not trivial matters: often the safety of a very vulnerable child was at stake. With patience and cheerfulness and in flawless Urdu (as far as I could tell) Catherine listened, thought and acted – over and over again.

"This award is very exciting for us as this is a very high level of recognition and the whole of the Church of Scotland should be celebrating this. Catherine left for Pakistan in 1961 and the sacrifice and contribution she has made to the lives of generations of people in Sialkot should not be underestimated."

Lasswade and Rosewell Choir

As I indicated in the last issue of The Link Moira and I shall be in Singapore for the second part of December. We are there to meet two new members of the family, Sebastian Fraser Dryden and Montgomery Ross Dryden who were born on 20th October and we also look forward to seeing three year old Hamish again as well as their parents Andrew and Rene.

It will be an experience spending Christmas in this part of the world, practically on the Equator, in humid temperatures. Will we be singing "In the bleak midwinter"? Possibly, as the carols which are sung by the Christian Community are those which have been largely imported and brought in by Christian settlers from the UK and other countries. Last year I was in Singapore in November and I made inquiries about any carols written by Singaporeans, thinking I could use them here but the carols the locals were singing were mainly those familiar to us. A lot of decorations go up early but trading continues on Christmas Day itself as the Island City caters for so many diverse cultures. So it will be interesting.

We shall be missing the Christmas services here and I hope these go well. Andrew Jack will be covering for me at Lasswade and I am extremely grateful to him. Andrew is always very willing to help but he is also very busy with choir commitments with Cockpen and The Dalkeith Singers, not to mention his own personal arrangements at this time. Thank you, Andrew, not just for covering at Christmas but at other times throughout the year. I really do appreciate it.

I would also like to thank our regular choir for all their help and encouragement week by week and for enriching the worship with their singing. As I have said before, without the support of these ladies and gentlemen I would have given up well before now. My thanks are also extended to those from both congregations who augment the choir for special music. I am very grateful to you for giving your time and talents.

One carol which may be sung over the Christmas period is "It came upon the midnight clear". Our Minister usually has this hymn on Remembrance Sunday as well. The references to "the woes of sin and strife rolling over two thousand years of wrong" are very relevant today - as are the words "the hopes and fears of all the years are met in you tonight" in the carol "O little town of Bethlehem".

The writer of "It came upon a midnight clear" is Edmund Hamilton Sears (1810-1876) who was a Unitarian parish minister. In 1838 he supplied the pulpit for the First Congregational Church in Wayland, Massachusetts. The congregation were very impressed by his voice and character that they extended a call to him and he was ordained there in 1839.

Although he was happy in Wayland, with a growing family to support he felt he needed a larger, and more prosperous, charge and to this end he had a good

ministry in Lancaster between 1840-47 but that was cut short by illness and depression. He was unable to preach in a voice loud enough to be heard in a large building so he returned to Wayland for recuperation and resumed his ministry there in 1848. That lasted until 1865.

He wrote his well known carol in 1849 at a time when he was feeling low. Various external problems contributed to his feelings, such as the recent war between the USA and Mexico and this incident was at the forefront of his writing about a world as dark and "full of sin and strife" and not hearing the Christmas message. Incidentally, the second half of verse three of this carol as it appears in CH4 has been altered from the original which was:-

"And man at war with man hears not the love song which they bring; O hush the noise ye men of strife and hear the angels sing"

Mr. Sears also believed that God does reach down from a great distance the human race but His "peace" is dependant on a human response.

I am aware that there are, as always, families within our midst for whom this time will not be easy. The Choir join me in hoping that all our readers and their families will experience the peace which this season can bring.

6. CHILD PROTECTION

Since the last edition of "The Link" magazine, the media have reported a series of horrific events concerning children in wider society. It is therefore important that we give you some assurance about the care of your children when they are at Sunday School. All of our teachers and staff working with your children have had Enhanced Disclosure checks as required by the Church of Scotland. This has now been superseded by the Protection of Vulnerable Groups Scheme (PVG) - this has been mentioned previously in the magazine. Our people will join the PVG Scheme some time over the next 3 years from October 2012. We would expect that a priority will be given to those of us in Sunday School.

Your child's care and welfare is important to us which is why we encourage parents to join us in Sunday School and see what we do - you will always be made welcome.

This is a really difficult subject and if anyone has any concerns about anything we do in Sunday School, it is important you raise this with our Child Protection Officer who is Dorothy Spence from Lasswade or our Minister.

THE HOLY HIKERS

After a day's walk everything has twice its usual value George Macauley Trevelyan



We have only had two walks since the last issue of "The Link" so there's not really a lot to tell. Or is there?

Our walk in September was most unusual and a bit spooky. I have always wanted to visit Gilmerton Cove and on that day we did.

Gilmerton Cove is situated on the left hand side of the main road just before the crossroads at the Supperbowl. Guided Tours are run by Rosslyn Tours under the auspices of Gilmerton Heritage Trust which is a voluntary body formed in 1997 to promote heritage sites within Gilmerton conservation village. It is a maze of rooms and passages that lie hidden beneath the village. Legend has it that in 1724, local blacksmith George Paterson carved tunnels and seating areas from the sandstone bedrock. He and his family lived there even though it was his workshop. Speculation is rife as to its disputed origins. Was it a Covenanter's Church or a Smuggler's Den or an illegal whisky still? Or was it connected to the Hellfire Club or even a secret Masonic Lodge? Or was it just the blacksmith's workshop and a family home? None of these questions were answered for us but the tour was fascinating and we enjoyed a walk in Moredun woods afterwards.

We had a meeting on 16th September when we arranged our new programme of walks for the winter months.

Our first one of the new session was to Clovenfords near Galashiels. The day before the walk was extremely wet and proved to be a rather muddy walk but nevertheless enjoyable.

1ST Corinthians Ch. 3, verses 16 - 19.
