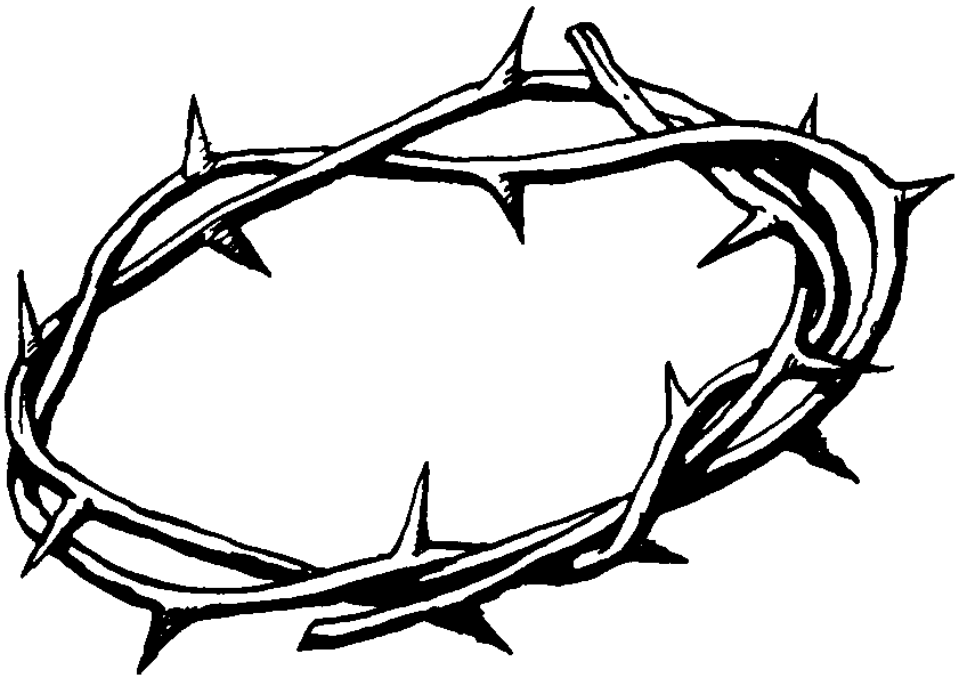

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Dear Friends,

As I write, we are in the season of Lent, but looking forward to Easter. On Good Friday Jesus Christ endured abandonment by his friends, a sham trial before Pilate and then the barbarity of crucifixion. The Easter message of Christ's resurrection – hope over coping despair and life overcoming death – is one that I urge you to think upon afresh this year. The profound message of the resurrection of Christ offers us not only hope and joy, but salvation.

The past few months have been an extremely difficult time for my wife and me. My dear father-in-law, Hans-Jürgen Herbold, died in January following a long illness. Whilst over in Germany for the funeral my wife sadly suffered another miscarriage; she had to spend several days in hospital there. We have both found the past few weeks arduous. Your prayers, kind words, cards and flowers have been deeply appreciated; we both wish to express our thanks. I have had to postpone a great deal of work and concentrate on essentials, such as Sunday services. There will be a Presbytery "visitation" to the congregations shortly; this would have taken place in January.

Following a suggestion, I would like to start a Bible study group. Please let me know if you are interested. Also, as ever, please let me know if you or someone at home or in hospital would like a visit.

Are you going on a foreign holiday this year? Do you need a new passport? Applications can take several weeks. I am happy to countersign passport applications as appropriate.

Please do come to the Holy Week and Easter services in Church. On Easter Day (Sunday 31st March) there will be a family service followed by a meal and Easter egg hunt at Rosewell Church starting at 10.00 am. There will be more traditional Easter Day services at Lasswade at 10.00 am and Cockpen at 11.30 am. The Easter message of hope will have a particularly important and very personal meaning for Kristina and me this year. We both wish you and your family a very happy Easter.

FROM THE ORGANIST

When I arrived at the church last Sunday there was snow on the ground and yet we are barely a month away from Easter. That is of course a “moveable feast” and this is one of the years where it reaches us in March – leaving not too much time since Christmas to work on our musical programme!

At the time of writing the programme for the nightly services in Holy Week had yet to be finalised. In any event the Choir and I will be performing whichever evening we are allocated, and this year’s programme will include an unaccompanied setting of the “Stabat Mater” by Kodaly, one of the leading Hungarian composers of the first half of the last century. The text is an ancient one and depicts the sorrows of Mary at the foot of the cross, which of course makes it particularly appropriate for Good Friday – perhaps a sign that we will be singing that evening!

After the sombre mood of Holy Week we will move to the celebrations of Easter Day, and this year we are bringing back to our repertoire what many might regard as the most celebratory of all music, namely the “Hallelujah Chorus” from Handel’s “Messiah”. This of course requires a robust body of singers and I’m happy to say that some of our regular choir supporters will be swelling the ranks on that occasion. I hope as many as possible will join us for what should be an uplifting occasion.

I often play music from the French repertoire at Easter as it includes some of the most sparkling music written for the organ. This year my concluding voluntary comes from closer to home however, in the form of Henry Smart’s “Postlude in D”, which is a stirring (and demanding!) piece despite its modest title. Smart was one of the great English organists of the later 19th century, as well as being a notable writer of hymn tunes – the one we still sing to “Glory be to God the Father” is a good example. This piece borrows something of the style of Handel, so it should be a good companion to our anthem.

The Holy Week and Easter services are always a musical highlight of our year and we look forward to seeing you there.

Bonnyrigg Midwinter Duck Race 2013

The 12th annual Bonnyrigg Midwinter Duck Race took place on Sunday 27th January in the teeth of strong winds, rain and sleet. Despite this there was a very heartening crowd to cheer more than 600 ducks down a stretch of the Pittendreich Burn.

The sum raised for the Midlothian work of Children 1st and the Edinburgh and Lothians Family Support Group of the Scottish Huntington's Association was £1,512.79, more than £500 down on last year.

However, we did achieve a notable first, thanks to Laura Piper, STV journalist and camerawoman extraordinaire. She came all the way from Glasgow, to report on the event and do some filming. Crossroads Caring Scotland Midlothian and East Lothian

Crossroads Caring Scotland Midlothian and East Lothian Service is one of 42 Crossroads services operating in Scotland, from Shetland to Dumfries and Lower Nithsdale.

Anyone who was a “soap” fan in the seventies may recognize the name “Crossroads” as the title of a TV series set in a motel. In 1973 an episode of this series featured a storyline where Sandy Richardson, the son of the motel owner was paralysed as a result of a car accident. His mother then had to care for him at home. Noel Crane, a local man from Rugby, who was similarly being cared for by his mother, saw the programme and wrote in to the programme makers, ATV, praising their portrayal of the needs of someone with a disability and the corresponding demands on the carer. They took him on as an advisor on disability issues, sharing his concerns about the lack of support for people, like his mother, whose lives had undergone significant change as a result of the illness, accident or disability through ageing, of someone close.

ATV then donated £10,000 to set up a pilot project in Rugby with the aim of helping carers in a practical way, in order to relieve their stress. That was in 1974. In the first year of operation Crossroads supported 26 families.

Crossroads Caring Scotland was established in the late seventies and now supports around 8,500 carers in Scotland and provides 839,942 hours of care every year. Projects had begun to take root in Scotland in 1977, pioneered by Douglas G. Wood, then chair of the Glasgow branch of the Disablement Income Group, backed by Sir Ferguson Anderson, Professor of Geriatric Medicine and Young Chronic Sick at Glasgow University.

The Midlothian and East Lothian project has 28 highly trained Care Attendants working in homes throughout Midlothian and East Lothian from Penicuik to Dunbar. Their role is to look after an ill or disabled loved one whether husband, wife, mother, friend or neighbour, anyone close enough to be in a caring relationship, while the main carer takes time out.

This is a service provided in the person’s own home. It enables the carer to do things others take for granted but difficult for the carer because of the time and commitment involved in his or her caring role. Simple things like going out with friends, personal shopping, pursuing interests, just

resting and getting badly needed sleep. We have an experienced leadership and supervisory staff of three based at the Fisherrow Community Centre, South Street, Musselburgh, EH21 6AT. In addition to carer support we also provide a companionship and enabling service to lone householders at risk of social isolation.

The Manager or Senior Care Attendant at Fisherrow carries out the initial visit to the prospective service user, to assess and agree the appropriate and desired care and support. Every effort is made to match one of the Care Attendants to the service user to maximise the quality of the relationship and understanding between the two and the benefit to the service user. This personalised care package is set up and then reviewed regularly.

Access to the service is either through an assessment of need by staff of the local Social Work Department or by a direct approach to our Crossroads office for those who wish to fund the care privately through their own resources, or from public funds through use of Direct Payments, Independent Living Fund or Self Directed Support. If the Social Work Department agrees to arrange a Crossroads service there may be a contribution required, dependent on income.

Appeal for Gift Aid Donors

Within our Congregation of 234 members we have 24 Gift Aid donors enabling our Church to receive annual Gift Aid income of around £2,500, and over the years this 'free' marginal income has helped to keep our General Fund afloat.

So far so good, but sadly I now have to inform members that due to increasing costs, beyond our control, we now have a projected deficit of £3,130.

Your Congregational Board now has to try and turn this around! An unenviable task, especially in these difficult times when we just cannot keep asking the same people for more and more!

So, where do we go from here?

Cost cutting is not an option because over the years this has been systematically addressed. However, within this apparent 'gloom and doom' there is a possible solution that would come at no cost whatsoever to members!

The solution? Gift Aid, where the Church can recover 25p for every £1 given in offerings.

To illustrate the fuller benefit of this, an additional 30 Gift Aid donors with an average weekly offering of say £5 would generate £1,950 in Gift Aid recoveries. This would reduce the deficit and give the Board a realistic chance to shore up the shortfall!

The Board are aware that, for various reasons, members might be wary of committing themselves to becoming Gift Aid donors. Hopefully the following information will ease any concerns:

- (1) Gift Aid donors must be taxpayers because the Scheme is designed to redirect part of the tax deducted from their wages, salaries and interest, on to a charity of their choice. (As opposed to where the Treasury would spend this money).
- (2) Gift Aid donations can be varied to suit personal circumstances. There is no commitment to give a particular amount, or, to give for a specific period of time - all of this is left entirely at the discretion of the donor.
- (3) The Board must by law, keep a record of Gift Aid donations. For our purposes these are recorded through WFO, BACs, or Cheques- whatever method suits the donor. All records are held in strict confidence.

The Board would now wish to make an appeal to all our 'taxpaying' members to consider joining the Gift Aid Scheme and if anyone is interested, or, would like more information, please do not hesitate to get in touch. My contact details are on the inside cover of the 'Link'.

There is more than enough food in the world for everyone but one in eight people will go to bed hungry tonight.

I am sure I speak for the Choir when I say that our thoughts are with Kristina and Matthew at this time. The last few months have not been easy for them but we hope they know the thoughts of many are with them and with that in their minds, and with their faith, we hope they will be able to face the days ahead.

As Moira and I were in Singapore over Christmas we did not do any special music over the festive season. At the time of writing I hope to do something at Easter but that depends on numbers available. My thanks are, as always, due to the regular Choir for their support each week and also to those who augment the Choir from time to time. Thank you everyone.

As far as Singapore was concerned, yes it was good to see our family and to meet the new arrivals. I think we both failed miserably at trying to tell the twins apart! However it was very strange hearing carols blaring from shopping malls, in the street, etc saying things like "Let it snow, let it snow, let it snow" when all one wanted to do was to dive into an air conditioned shopping mall and get out of the humid temperature. And here is another thing. There are a lot of churches built to serve the many traditions of faiths which are active in Singapore. Many of them have car parks in their compound and there are scores of, presumably, volunteers around to help direct the drivers into a suitable parking space. On the face of it these churches seem to be well attended.

Looking towards Easter, one of the great hymns of the Christian Faith which we shall be singing will be "Thine be the glory, risen, conquering, Son". Triumphant words and sung to the equally triumphant tune "Maccabaeus" which was written by arguably the greatest musical giant of all time, George Frederic Handel. The tune is set to the words of "See the conquering hero comes" in Handel's oratorio "Judas Maccabaeus".

The words of the hymn which we sing in the UK today are a translation from the French "A toi la gloire O Ressucite", written by Edmond Louis Budry who was born in Vevey in Switzerland in 1854 and who studied at Lausanne. He was a pastor in several places before becoming pastor to the Free Church in Vevey for thirty five years before retiring in 1923. As well as writing hymns of his own he translated lyrics in several European languages into French. He died in 1932.

Mr. Budry's French text was translated into English by Richard Birch Hoyle who was born in Lancashire in 1875. He served as a Baptist minister for 26 years before working for the YMCA. He worked in the USA for a couple of years from 1934 before returning to England to become pastor at the Baptist Church in Kingston-upon-Thames. In the course of his life he translated thirty French hymns into English and twelve from other languages. He died in Wimbledon in 1939.

The choir join me in wishing all our readers a Happy Easter.

Lasswade Old Parish Church

Discovery of Seating Plan dated 1886

Around the beginning of this year a few people were cleaning out the cupboard under the stairs at the south east end of the present Lasswade Parish Church and came across a rolled up piece of paper. One of those present had the presence of mind to open up this item and discovered that it was a Seating Plan, dated 1886, of the then, restored Lasswade Old Parish Church. While the plan was basically in good condition considering it had been lying around for 127 years it had suffered a bit of wear and tear. (I am sure you will agree that any individual who reaches 127 would be entitled to succumb to ageing defects!) The people who found it felt that this document should go on display and not be mothballed again. However, they sought to remedy the defects first.

Carle Murphy was consulted and felt that this plan could be restored. Carle has repaired it and, together with her husband Tom, has placed it in a glass display panel. It was felt that a short historical overview of the development of the Church in Lasswade from 1240 to the present day might be of interest. Accompanying notes and interesting photographs are placed on either side of the Seating Plan. These notes convey information about Lasswade Old, the forming of what became known as Strathesk Church, the union of these two congregations in 1956 and the subsequent linkings and unions. The Seating Plan is positioned on the west wall and will be formally dedicated shortly.

To quote from the wording on the document it is a "Plan showing in colour position of the pews as allocated after their reconstruction in 1886". There is a Plan of the Area, and a Plan of the Galleries and a note that the "Total Sittings in Area and 3 Galleries is 922". Reference is made to the pews of the local gentry who worshipped in the galleries of the building in 1886. Could there be records available which detail who, among the common laity, worshipped elsewhere in the church?

The Architects for this reconstruction work were Hardy and Wight. This firm were also the Architects for the renovation work which took place in the present Parish Church in 1894 and my grandfather, Robert Dryden, was a journeyman joiner and was one of the craftsmen employed by Hardy and Wight to construct the pulpit, the pews and other woodwork much of which can still be seen today.

From a book - 'Facing the Storm'

Another story from the book 'Meditation and Prayers by *Eddie Askew* that I'd like to share with you. I have enjoyed these books so much and would commend them to you. **G.S.**

Mark 15 :33 - 39

Three gospel writers each tell us about the veil of the Temple being torn in two as Jesus died on the cross. It was important to them.

The Temple in Jerusalem wasn't just a place for sacrifice and worship. To the Jewish people, it was the place where the Spirit of God lived on Earth. The central part of the Temple was the Holy of Holies, and God was there. It had no door, but was screened from the rest of the Temple by a heavy curtain - the veil.

No-one but the High Priest could enter, and he, only once a year, at Yom Kippur, the Day of Atonement.

Bible commentators catch hold of the symbolism of the torn curtain. In Jesus' death, they say the way to God is thrown open, and men and women can approach him freely in a new relationship.

I see another angle to it. The tearing of the curtain not only lets us in, it lets the Spirit of God out. God can't be contained.

Holiness is no longer boxed in, but released into the world. Through the cross, it pours out in a flood to swamp us - not in dread and guilt, but in love and wonder.

Lord, I'm swimming in the wonder of it all. That in your love, and through your suffering, the obstacles that stand between us are torn apart.

At your initiative the sea wall is breached, the floodgates opened wide, your Spirit loosed upon the world. And, sink or swim, I'm caught up in a tide of hope, held on the flood.

I grasp the wonder, but I must confess the times it's frightened me. Still does, this flood of holiness. I'd rather paddle gently in the shallows, than strike out into your depths. Put out a toe, cautious thermometer, to feel the cold before I take the plunge. Your sea is wider than my imagination, your waves higher than my courage.

Its gentleness can be deceptive. There are times when I can feel the winds, storm force, blow through my life with strength that leaves me breathless. Uncomfortable, Lord.

And then I am reminded that the storms, the calms, are in your hands. You stilled the sea, Still me.
