

The choir will be performing Elgar's setting of "Ecce Sacerdos Magnus", and while this may originally have been written for the enthronement of a bishop I am sure our new Minister deserves no less! At the close of the service I will be playing Widor's "Marche Pontificale" which also seems appropriate as it was written with a ceremonial event involving a large gathering of clergy in mind.



Introducing Lorna M Souter

Although both my grandfathers were ministers in the Church of Scotland, going into full time ministry myself was not something I had ever thought of doing. Growing up at



On leaving St Andrews, my initial thoughts were to serve overseas with Wycliffe Bible Translators but then paths led instead to become Assistant Warden for two years at the Badenoch Christian Centre (at that time run by National Mission) in Kincraig near Aviemore. From there, I worked for three years as an outdoor pursuits instructor with the Abernethy Trust team at Nethybridge. It was during these years on Speyside, that I found myself unexpectedly leading worship at local churches and a sense of call to full-time ministry of Word and Sacrament with the Church of Scotland began to grow. Despite not getting through Selection Conference when I first applied, I still completed my Bachelor of Divinity at New College in Edinburgh before taking two years abroad, teaching English first in Poland



and then in China. I felt uncertain about re-applying to the Church of Scotland on my return home in 2005, so I began working in administration with the Chief Executive's

team at the Scottish Court Service in Edinburgh. At last, after doing my Local Review at Juniper Green Parish Church, I was encouraged to attend Selection Conference once again and I was delighted to be accepted in June 2012. Alongside doing two further years of study at New College in 2012-14 to complete an MSc in Science and Religion, I enjoyed practical training placements at St Andrew's Clermiston, at Blackhall St Columba's and with the chaplaincy team at the Western General Hospital. My time on Probation, which finished at the end of November 2015, was spent at Mayfield Salisbury Parish Church.

My favourite pastimes include hill walking, bird watching, golf (much room for improvement!), taking up the fiddle once again and visits to the theatre, the cinema, concerts and ballet.

May I thank you all for the warmth and kindness of your welcome already. I very much look forward to starting in March and embarking with you on the journey and adventure of seeking to be Christ's church today in the midst of our modern community.

First of all, could I extend our best wishes to Miss Souter and wish her well in her ministry among us.

I would like, as usual, to extend my thanks to the regular choir for their support Sunday by Sunday. Thank you also to those who augmented the choir on the Sunday Miss Souter preached as Sole Nominee, and the enthusiasm, which you showed then, will stand you in good stead for me contacting you again if I want to do any special music! Thank you to one and all.

The choir were represented in an unusual situation towards the end of November when Raymond and I were patients in the same ward, at the same time, in St. John's Hospital in Livingston. We were opposite one another in a four-bedded section of the ward. However, I am pleased to report we are both moving on, healthwise, and I am also delighted that the other members of the choir who had health problems during 2015 seem to be progressing as well.

Those of us who knew her were saddened to hear of the death of Mrs. Margaret Waugh on 10th January. Many of us will remember rejoicing with Margaret and Alec on the occasion of their Diamond Wedding in March 2014 just a few months before Alec's death. Margaret augmented the choir from time to time in the 1960s and 1970s and I thank her for the support she gave to the choir. Margaret was also a very loyal member of the Woman's Guild for many years and for a lot of that time she was President of the Lasswade Woman's Guild. Margaret was a very loyal supporter of the Local History Society, and served on the Society's Committee for about 15 years and part of that time she acted as Vice Chairman. Our sympathy is extended to her daughters Fiona and Heather and their families.

Around the beginning of the year "St. Clement" was sung a few times at services at which I was playing although not to the words with which this tune is normally associated, namely, "The day Thou gavest, Lord, is ended". However, I got to thinking about "The day Thou gavest" and the worldwide coverage encompassed by this hymn. We all accept that the world is a shrinking place - air travel takes us to the far flung continents in a matter of hours and so "the sun that bids us rest is waking our brethren 'neath the western sky" takes on a new meaning as flights travel from lands covered in darkness into places where "the dawn leads on another day". If you are in business and have contacts in other continents and/or have family abroad you have to be aware of the time difference between the UK and wherever your contacts are, but the interesting thing is that while we take our rest and sleep, activity is taking place elsewhere. The same can be true of worship, with it's many different traditions worldwide, - "....your Church unsleeping while earth moves onward into light, through all the world her watch is keeping and rests not now by day or night". And here is another thing while adults may be cynical at times about matters spiritual (and other factors) the young can give a new insight into things - "fresh lips are making Thy wondrous doings heard on high". In this time of change for our congregations may it be true that "the voice of prayer is never silent nor dies the strain of praise away".

On a different theme, if you will pardon the pun, a lot of our hymn and psalm tunes are named after places – Chilton Foliat, Saffron Walden, Down Ampney, Stroudwater, Devises and Crimond to name just a few. It would be interesting to visit these places in person – perhaps some of you have been to them – but I may do some research as to why some of these places gave their names to the hymns/psalms which they accompany and report back in a future issue of the Link.
