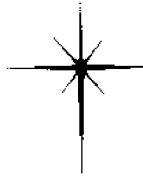

This will go towards the building costs of the orphanage in India and will enable us to make considerable progress in this work. As all of our costs are covered by sponsorship this means that every penny raised at the event will go towards the orphanage. This will make a vast difference to children like Kalpana who was born with an extensive birth mark all over her body. Her father decided that she was a curse and tried to leave her at the railway station as well as holding her head in a bucket of water. Her mother took her to live with Samuel Babu so that she would be kept in a place of safety. At present ten children sleep in his own house, but once the new orphanage is opened they will have a new home where they are cared for and kept safe, along with many other children from the streets. Our long term supporters will be pleased to hear that this year's programme will generally be following the familiar pattern, and here are this year's dates to note:-

Sunday 30 November

While this is Advent Sunday and not therefore a Christmas event as such I thought I would nevertheless take the chance to advertise the music at what will be our annual joint service for all of the churches, which takes place in Cockpen this time round. The choir will be singing a splendid seasonal anthem by Mendelssohn, "There shall a star from Jacob come forth", one of the last pieces which he composed.

From a book - 'Facing the Storm' by Eddie Askew.

I was recently given two books of Meditations and Prayers written by Eddie Askew who, for much of his life worked with leprosy sufferers and I thought that we could share in one of his thoughts. (John chapter 1 verses 1 - 9).

The morning service had just begun. It was the third Sunday in Advent, and the two children went forward and lit the Advent candles. From the pew behind me a little boy was keeping up a barrage of questions to granny. Finally, as the children went back to their seats, he asked loudly, 'Who's going to blow the candles out?'

I suppose his only experience of candles was on his birthday cake, when he had been encouraged to blow them out in one big breath. That, he thought, was the only thing to do with candles.

The words in John's gospel came to me; **'The light shines in the darkness, but the darkness has not overcome it'**.

Not for the want of trying. It seems at times as though all the powers of the world are trying to put out the light Jesus brought, and that they would think it was a birthday celebration if they succeeded. But, weak though it seems, the candle flame of love flickers on, dispelling the darkness around it, ready to ignite new lights wherever there is faith and commitment.

Why should it be like that? Why is there such opposition? An alternative translation says '...but the darkness has not understood it'. The light looks like a threat. It frightens, shows up the things we'd rather have hidden, disturbs us.

We don't understand that the truth is different. That light promises life, freedom, and an end to fear. The irony is that we have to find the courage to affirm it before the fear can be dealt with. The courage to make a leap of faith through the darkness towards that candle flame of love. But, is it really such a risk? It burns with all the power of God, and it's been burning for a long time, in spite of all the huffing and puffing of the world.

'Shine in the darkness, Lord. Dispel the doubt and fear that cling so close.

Turn the weak moonlight of my faith to a brighter day in which I see your radiance, know your love.'

Mary Slessor



"Charity begins at home" we often hear said. In the case of Mary Slessor, indefatigable and above all, a courageous-against impossible odds missionary, bravery and conviction began at home when, years before she fought for Christianity and women's rights in Nigeria, she was cornered by a local gang of ne'er-do-wells in Dundee. They threatened her with a metal weight on a piece of string, swinging it nearer and nearer her face and taunting her to flinch. Mary defied them and in her turn taunted them, denying any fear and telling them that if she stood her ground, they should follow her to Sunday school. She did, they followed... and many more were to follow this determined redhead. Mary Slessor was born in Gilcomston, Aberdeen on December 2nd 1848. Her father, Robert, was a shoemaker and her mother a deeply religious soul with a marked interest in missionary work in Calabar, Nigeria. When Mary was eleven, the family moved to Dundee where her father became a mill labourer after having to abandon his trade of cordwainer, due to alcoholism. Note the lessons and influences here for

the formative Mary – the curse of too much of a good thing as opposed to the passion to rid a people of too much of a bad one. But I'm making it sound easy. It certainly was not, for as young as fourteen Mary was working a 12-hour day in a jute mill, rising at 5 am to help with the housework (she was the second of seven children) then busy at the mill from 6 am to 6 pm. Her mother's religious influence took effect and the young Slessor volunteered to become a teacher at the recently instituted mission at Quarry Pend. Hard work, wariness of evil, facing stiff odds and – ironically – a basic fear of the male of the species prepared Mary for her life's work. Africa was calling; she was to become there "The Mother of all Peoples". On August 5th, 1876, after training in Edinburgh and with the approbation of the Foreign Missionary Board of the United Presbyterian Church, she set sail for Calabar arriving a month later, an incongruous figure in West Africa, red haired, blue eyed and – as she described herself – "wee and thin and not very strong". Nigeria was at the time going through one of its turbulent phases – confusion following the abolition of slavery (Lagos was a major trading centre for slaves until 1851); the forceful arrival of British rule in 1861; the mish-mash of tribal autonomies and various chiefs with their varying laws.

Polygamy was rife amongst leaders, severe corporal punishment the norm and superstitions such as it was justified to slay new-born twins who were looked upon as an

abomination. Human sacrifice was also not unknown. How was the young Miss Slessor to deal with all this? Her ploy was simple, but very difficult – she set out to become part of the community whilst remaining her Scots Presbyterian self. She learned the Efik language and so could hear the native's argument without being misled. She lived in the native style, sleeping sometimes in the open, absorbed the local culture and came to terms with local traditions. This whole-hearted and sincere integration led the local governor to invite Mary Slessor to become a member of the Itu court. To illustrate the authority Mary had in tribal litigious matters consider this case. One night, two (probably) frustrated wives of the local chief sneaked off to see a man. The other two wives knew about this 'infidelity' but kept silent. The chief found out and ordered punishment for all four spouses – 100 lashes of the crocodile whip. Mary knew that often, this led to death and that sometimes the guilty party suffered salt in the wounds and had a few fingers and/or toes chopped off for good measure! She intervened pointing out that with the polygamous system young wives were bound to become a little bored. The condemned wives thought they were 'off the hook'. Affronted, the chief asked if Mary's God condoned adultery to which she replied "No, but he is a forgiving God" (the four wives almost smiled with relief) she added, however, that He does not forgive sin and that the crocodile whip was appropriate BUT... 10 lashes, no salt and no amputations! The chief and his elders agreed.

There are many more tales to show the power that this diminutive Aberdonian commanded in Nigeria but space does not allow their telling. Mary Slessor's mission in Nigeria was curtailed by illness and ended by a mortal fever on January 13th 1915. Her sojourn in West Africa was one undertaken before the introduction of the medicines and drugs that were to combat malaria, smallpox and other feverish diseases and one that was too early to benefit from the use of motor vehicles and tarmac roads. She was buried in Nigeria at a full state funeral, her grave marked by a cross of Scottish granite.

Mary Slessor left us with a few points to ponder:

God is never behind time.

If you play with temptation do not expect God to deliver you.

The secret of all failure is disobedience.

Half the world's sorrow comes from the unwisdom of parents.

An arm of flesh never brings power.

There are many more. If you want to see Mary Slessor plus a map of Calabar and scenes from her missionary work it will cost you £10... on the Clydesdale banknote of that denomination!

Ladies Bible Study will be held Thursday morning at 10 AM. All ladies are invited to lunch in the Fellowship Hall after the B.S. is done.

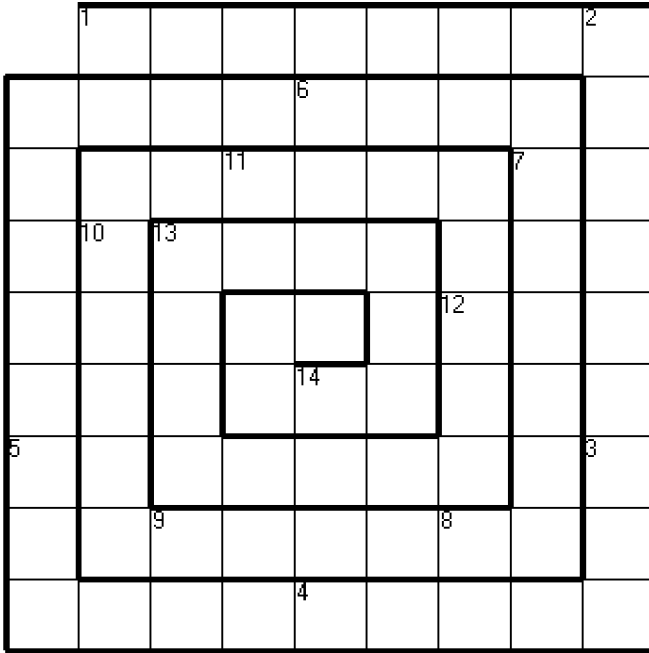
The pastor would appreciate it if the ladies of the Congregation would lend him their electric girdles for the pancake breakfast next Sunday.
