

Dear Friends,

Firstly, I offer my congratulations to the Guild for the 80th anniversary. The work of all the groups within the congregations is greatly appreciated.

As I write we are now in the season of Lent. The word “Lent” is perhaps slightly inappropriate; it is derived from the same source as the word lengthen (i.e. as in the lengthening of the days at this time of the year). The Lenten season is a time of preparation. We think how Jesus prepared himself for his future role by going into the wilderness for 40 days and nights; there he was tempted with food, wealth and power, but resisted. This is also a time of preparation for Easter; we think of how Jesus suffered on the Cross and his death and resurrection.

Recently, a class from one of the local primary schools visited Lasswade Church – the children’s questions were fascinating and very penetrating. One particular question was why did Jesus have to die on the Cross? In short, Jesus could have walked away from suffering, but that would have been to negate his calling. He became a one-off sacrifice for our sins. What contemporary images come to mind? Perhaps a firefighter going into a burning building, when everyone else is running the other way? what particularly struck me was that the children were shocked and appalled that Jesus had to endure capital punishment and suffered a gross miscarriage of justice before Pontius Pilate. Given that hanging was abolished in Great Britain in 1965 the very idea of capital punishment is now ancient history as far as they are concerned, but the idea of a fair trial is still very pertinent. I was also very moved and impressed by how the children discerned compassion, love and forgiveness in the person of Jesus. May Christ-like compassion, love and forgiveness inspire us all.

I have been asked to serve as the new Convener of the World Mission Committee of the Presbytery of Lothian. It is so easy for us to become preoccupied with issues that affect us locally, but as Christians it is vital for us to remember that we are part of the worldwide Church.

I have now been your minister for a little over six months; Kristina and I are greatly enjoying being here. So far, I have still not made as many home visits as I would have wished. If you – or someone you know (at home or in hospital) – would like a visit, please do not hesitate to let me know. I wish you and your family every blessing for Easter – may the Easter message of resurrection and joyous hope inspire us all.

The official emblem of the Church of Scotland



This is the official emblem of the Church of Scotland. The Church of Scotland first used the "burning bush" emblem in the late 1600s, when it was included on the printed reports to the General Assembly. The image is derived from Exodus 3:2 in the Old Testament - the account of Moses seeing a burning bush in the desert. In the hot desert, it was far from unusual to see a small, parched shrub catch fire and shrivel up. This bush was different; it was not consumed by the flames. We then read of Moses discerning the voice of God coming from the flames. The Latin motto "Nec Tamen Consumebatur" means "But it was not consumed". The Church of Scotland's emblem also incorporates a representation of St Andrew's cross in the background.

Congregational Board Meeting

The next meeting of the Congregational Board will be held on Tuesday, 27 April at 7.30 p.m. in Rosewell Church Hall and it is hoped that as many members as possible will be able to attend.

Lasswade and Rosewell Choir

During December the Choir sang four items at the Rosewell Carol Party and a couple of pieces at Lasswade on Christmas Sunday. One of the pieces which we did at Lasswade was a lullaby, Suo Gan, and as this proved very popular we plan to do it again at an early date. Once again can I express my thanks and appreciation to the regular Choir and to those friends who augmented the Choir for all their hard work. My continued appreciation is, as ever, extended to the regular Choir for their support each week.

As you know, St. Andrew's Day is November 30th. I am well aware that the Sunday nearest November 30th can often be the first Sunday in Advent when the Christian Church tends to focus on the meaning of Advent and poor Andrew is lucky if he gets a mention. I feel this is unfair because, if Andrew had decided not to follow Jesus, and if he had decided not to tell his brother about Jesus and get Simon involved, it is questionable whether the words and teachings of Our Lord would have attracted attention as quickly as they did.

Last year I knew I was not going to be around on November 29th so I asked if hymn 339 in CH4 could be included in the service for November 22nd. The hymn is "Sing of Andrew, John's disciple, led by faith through ways untrod" and it captures in a very simple way the basic facts about Andrew. From being a disciple of John, then stirred by this new teacher, running to tell his brother, leaving his boats and nets and kindred we are then told he trusted in that "Follow me". We are told that Andrew faithfully was there when the small boy's meal fed thousands and when the inquiring Greeks asked questions. In conclusion we are told that Andrew was sent to make the Gospel known, faithful to his Lord's example and called to make a cross his own.

I think this is my favourite hymn and one which I stumbled on when I was leafing through CH4 when the hymnary first came out. Andrew has long been a hero of mine and the fact that here was a hymn concentrating on him was great. When Mr. Ross preached as sole nominee I was delighted that in his children's address he referred to Andrew and, if my memory serves me correctly, he illustrated his talk with a Saltire, the Cross Andrew chose to be crucified upon because he felt unworthy to die on a Cross similar to his Lord's.

Carl P. Daw, Jnr, the author of the words, and the author of several hymns in CH4 and Common Ground, is an American, born in Louisville, Kentucky, in 1944. He graduated at several universities where he obtained his M.A., M. Div., and Ph.D. and became an American Episcopal priest. He served in various parishes in the Eastern United States before beginning work on hymns. He was elected Executive Director of the Hymn Society in the United States and Canada in 1996. The tune which is printed is "Nettleton" and this is an American melody in Wyeth's Repository of Sacred Music.

I would like to revert to Saint Andrew again to say that on the east wall in the Thistle Chapel of St. Giles' Cathedral there is a magnificent stained glass window of Andrew the fisherman with his nets. The artist is Dr. Douglas Strachan who stayed for many years at Pittendreich House in Lasswade. There are several other windows by Dr. Strachan in St. Giles' and also in The Shrine and St. Margaret's Chapel at the Castle.

Historical Reflections

You may recall that, for the last issue of The Link, I summarised some decisions taken at meetings of the Lasswade United Presbyterian/Lasswade United Free/Strathesk Church of Scotland Board of Managers between 1867 and 1932. I have now gone through some minutes of Session Meetings of Lasswade United Free/Strathesk Church of Scotland between 1904 and 1942 but these will have to wait until a future issue before they appear in print!

Meanwhile you might be interested to see what the Syllabus was for the Men's Guild of Strathesk Church, Lasswade, for the 1948/49 session.

How your money was spent in 2009 on property repairs and maintenance at Lasswade and Rosewell.

Painting of our property was the main task during 2009, with the windows at Lasswade painted both outside and inside along with the rhones and down pipes. The cost for this was £2,630. The outside windows were reached by using a cherry picker, which was a great boon as it meant we did not have to hire scaffolding and erect traffic lights to control traffic during the operation.

At Rosewell the wall and roof at the organ end of the church was repainted with a very good match of paint that meant a number of our congregation believed the whole church had been redecorated. The corridor to the vestry had the ceiling repaired and painted, and the vestry itself had the paper stripped from the ceiling and repainted. The costs incurred for this was £1,492.

The manse had more work carried out before the arrival of our minister and, unfortunately also after his arrival, where a leak was discovered in the kitchen along with damp under the floor. The wet room was removed and under the floor was treated to remove the damp. This also meant that the flooring in the kitchen had to be replaced. This set us back £1,166. During the heavy rain in the autumn a leak was detected in the small bedroom; R & R roofing carried out the repair free of charge. However, inside we had to redecorate after replacing the plasterboard, at a cost of £345. The minister at his own expense put in insulating material while the plasterboard was removed.

The fireplace was removed from the lounge, all the carpets lifted throughout the house and wooden flooring laid as a replacement, including the cost of the redecorating and replacement of skirting the bill for this work was £1,827. The minister also made a donation towards the cost of this work.

The other main cost within the property budget is the maintenance of our gardens. This is an annual cost of £1,640. As well as this expenditure there is also the vast amount of work the gardening group put in freely at the Lasswade gardens. I am sure that the members of the congregation appreciate the condition of the gardens and surrounds of the churches, and we thank all the volunteers for their efforts.

Most of the members of the church will have noticed the scaffolding that is in place at Rosewell, this is due to problems identified during a routine check of the roof, and the cost to have the scaffolding erected was £3,700. Checks were carried out at both churches.

At Lasswade routine pointing, maintenance and cleaning of the rhones has been identified. As well as the same routine items at Rosewell, the contractor identified that the cope stones were loose and in danger of slipping. The bell mechanism is also broken; this is a wooden wheel attached to the bell. The rope pulls it round to ring the bell. We have an architect involved to ensure that the repairs we carry out are best value for money and also to ensure that we will not need to revisit the problem in the near future.

These costs however are quite substantial for our congregation, at present the estimate for all the repairs and routine maintenance is £23,000. We have permission from the Presbytery of Lothian to move ahead with the repair.

We are at present approaching various funding bodies in an attempt to secure grant aid to assist us in meeting these costs.

The normal day-to-day costs such as heating, lighting ministerial stipend all will still need to be met. This means as a congregation we need to dip a little deeper into our pockets to help. We are looking to utilise some of our diminishing reserves to meet the costs and have the repairs carried out as soon as possible, but as a congregation we must replace this money if we are to survive into the future. To this end the social committee will be organising additional fundraising throughout the year that I hope we will all support.

In 2010 we will need to spend £23,000 to repair the bell tower and roof at Rosewell and carry out maintenance on the bell tower and roof of Lasswade.

2nd Ecumenical Kirchentag

Munich, Germany, 12-16 May 2010

It's time for the 2nd Ecumenical Kirchentag. Hundreds of thousands of Christians from Germany and all over the world will be coming together in Munich. This is a chance to meet, discuss our place as Christians in the world, to worship and celebrate together, seek visible ecumenical progress and make a stand for ecumenism. With the theme "That you may have hope", Christians will come together to profess our faith and face up to the social responsibility which arises from it.



Kirchentage have a long tradition. The first Protestant Kirchentag (literally meaning "church day") took place shortly after World War II to promote peace, reconciliation and a new awareness of faith – the most recent (the 32nd) took place in Bremen in 2009. The first ecumenical Kirchentag took place in Berlin in 2003 – with Protestant, Catholic and Orthodox participation.

All are welcome to this festival of faith – people from all Christian denominations and other religions. In more than 3,000 events – worship, bible workshops, panel discussions and workshops on social, ethical and political issues and much more – we shall be considering how we can successfully lead a Christian life in and for the contemporary world. Many of the events will take place in English, so don't worry if your knowledge of German is limited or non-existent!

Interfaith dialogue will also play an important role at the Kirchentag. Arising from our common responsibility we will seek ways to turn all this into acts of solidarity.

There will be a great cultural programme too. We will celebrate our Christian faith in many ways, with classical and traditional church music, brass bands, pop and jazz concerts, exhibitions and all kinds of art.

The deadline registration for people who want to book accommodation with the 2nd Ecumenical Kirchentag office is 8th March 2010.

From the Clerk.

It only seems like yesterday that we were being 'urged' to get our articles in for the Christmas magazine, **where does the time go?** I used to wonder when my Mum and Dad (and other older folks) said things like that but now, I understand. The other 'daily routine' for them and many of their age was to immediately turn to the obituary page in 'the News'. It was, to me, a young person, a peculiar thing to do - wanting to know who had died. I suppose I thought it was either a bit morbid or quite odd. **What is the first thing I do now when the Evening News arrives?** I can only think it must be an aging thing!

Looking to see who has 'passed on' is not necessarily morbid or peculiar, it is, for me a very natural thing to do. As Church people, we feel for all the families of the folks we read about who have died but, in particular, we want to be there for 'our own folks', folks we know, have grown up with and, love - a shoulder to cry on, an ear to listen, a voice to give comfort. We, at Cockpen and Carrington have lost many dear friends over the years just as Lasswade and Rosewell have and, although saddened by the loss, we have much to remember and be grateful for to the folks who had so much to do with us all.

As Clerk for over 20 years now I have written countless letters of condolence to families and wondered if at that time my words, telling them of my, and your sorrow really helps them. I think at sad times much is not taken in but, it is hoped that at some stage they will realize that so many of you do really care and want to be there for them if they want us.

But, on a brighter note, I feel the aging process, for me anyway, is an exciting time - I know that growing up was good in so many ways but, I have a feeling of much greater contentment now than I have ever had. Of course, perhaps this is just down to retirement which, I always say to people, although I have enjoyed all my working life, is the best job I have ever had! I have difficulty in understanding people who dread the day that they will have to give up work - for me, that has thankfully never been a problem. Of course, I understand that they may have good reasons in wanting to continue but, my advice would be - stop if you can, and enjoy.

Church life here and at Lasswade and Rosewell goes on with a busy Guild, Sunday School, OASIS, Bric a brac, cake stall, Choir practices, meetings and, all the other activities of our Churches. Matthew has now completed six months here with us and, with all that he is involved in with his own flock and, the other Churches in the area plus, his school visits he is, very much 'in with the bricks' here in Bonnyrigg.

Many happy events in our Church but, I think the most important one recently was the celebration of 80 years since our Guild was formed. A lovely Service (along with the children from the Sunday School) was held on 21st February to


Cake Stall.

FROM THE ORGANIST

Snow is falling as I write this article and it feels as if we are still very much in the middle of winter. Nevertheless, we are now also into Lent and accordingly Easter is less than 40 days and nights away!

At the time of writing the calendar for Holy Week has just been finalised. In the now time honoured fashion services will be taking place in one or other of the local churches each night that week, and following recent practice Cockpen will be the venue for the Good Friday service. The choir will be singing the old Spiritual "Were you there when they crucified my Lord?" as well as other music appropriate to the day.

The main musical celebrations will of course fall on Easter Day itself. Last year we marked the anniversary of Handel's death and this year we have another date to celebrate, as it is the 200th anniversary of the birth of Samuel Sebastian Wesley. While it could not be claimed he is a composer in the same league as Handel he was one of the founding fathers of the Anglican choral repertoire, and we shall be singing what is perhaps his best known anthem "Blessed be the God and Father", which was written for performance on Easter Day when Wesley was organist of Winchester Cathedral. It is quite a substantial piece, featuring a demanding soprano solo, and I am pleased to say that our own choir will once again be supported by several of our friends from the ranks of Dalkeith Singers.

Wesley came from a distinguished family, as he was in fact the grandson of the great hymn writer Charles Wesley. This links in neatly therefore with plans for the Sunday after Easter, which our Minister intends to devote to a celebration of Charles Wesley's hymns. That day (traditionally called "Low Sunday") can often feel a bit flat after the celebrations of Easter, but there should be no risk of that this year. While Wesley is celebrated the world over as a hymn writer it is perhaps less well known that he was also a composer and I will therefore be featuring his music in the organ voluntaries for that day also.

Two important Sundays for those of who enjoy hymn singing therefore, and I hope that as many as possible will also be able to attend at least some of the Holy Week services which I think contribute much to our worship.

As you know, I have included a few stories from the above book in previous issues of 'The Link' and want to share one more with you. I have enjoyed these books so much and would commend them to you. **G.S.**

Jesus came to Jerusalem. The people accepted him with enthusiasm as he rode in but, they missed the significance of his coming. He came as a King but, he came as a King on a donkey.

Riding the donkey, he rejected both the reality and the trappings of power. This King-on-a-donkey refused to conform to the expected image, the accepted values of the society of his time. He came humbly, choosing the way of peace. Relying on the quiet persistence of love, rather than the sterile forces of compulsion.

Jesus was a nonconformist, a rebel. Not for the sake of rebellion, and not deliberately. His values were so different from those of his day that they brought him inevitably into conflict.

That's where it all turned sour. It was one thing to challenge the authorities. That's always popular with the people. We enjoy seeing the rich and famous embarrassed. It's comforting to see they don't always get their own way. We applaud as we read of him overturning the tables of the moneychangers but, his lifestyle challenges everyone. Then and now. You and me. Challenges us to change, not just the man or woman across the street.

If Jesus entered my city today I've a feeling he'd appear, not in a company car, but, on a tatty bicycle, with his trousers tucked into the tops of his socks. And the first call he'd make wouldn't be at the cathedral but at the Job Centre to see who needed help.

I wonder then, who'd cry "Hosanna" and who "Crucify"?

Lord, the donkey must have been surprised.

It wasn't used to all that noise.

It wasn't used to people riding on its back.

Thank you for supporting the worship, mission and service of the Church through the money you give in your offering. It is important that you know what happens to this money. This letter tells you about your congregation's Ministries and Mission Contribution - the money your Congregational Treasurer sends to the Church Offices in Edinburgh. How does it enable the worship, mission and service of the Church?

The information below shows how the contributions from your linked congregations are used to support Parish Ministries, Mission and Renewal, and general support and services provided for congregations and the councils of the General Assembly. Please note that the cost of your minister is not what he/she is paid. This cost is the total for stipend and employer's national insurance and pension contributions, and is based on a minister with ten years' service.

This supports the Church's work in resourcing congregations for Christian education and outreach, in caring for the vulnerable in society, in partnership with Churches in some of the poorest parts of the world, and in providing a Christian perspective on the social, political and moral issues of today.

Support and Services for Councils and Congregations (7.5%) **£2,648**

This provides financial, legal, procedural, safeguarding and other services, and meets the cost of the General Assembly and the Moderator.

Please note that Ministries and Mission Contributions only provide part of the total funding required for the work of the Church listed above. A fuller picture is given in the leaflet *Funding our Faith*, which is available free to all congregations.

I hope that this helps you to understand Ministries and Mission Contributions and shows you are enabling the sharing of the gospel through the money your congregation sends *through* the Church Offices to all parts of Scotland and beyond.
