On searching through some old papers (that I shouldn't even have) I came across the following Estimate from Rushworth and Dreaper Ltd in connection with work to our Organ. The estimate was submitted to the Kirk Session in **1942**......

'We, the undersigned, hereby undertake to make two/three visits per annum, at regular periods, to the Organ in the above Church, and at each visit to thoroughly tune, regulate and adjust any irregularities of the action work which may be necessary, also to examine and check the lubrication of the blowing apparatus, and oil the bearings as found necessary, for the sum of -

Two visits - £3-10-0 per annum or

Three visits - £5 - 0 - 0 per annum

This estimate does not include repairs or adjustments rendered necessary by vermin, excessive heat or damp, or accidents over which we have no control, neither does it include any repairs or replacements in connection with the blowing apparatus'.

Changed days as far as costs go!! I wonder if Nat. Fisher, Andrew Jack (because he's nearest) myself or any others who have had to 'pump' the Organ on the few occasions that the power goes down come into the 'blowing apparatus' category? We certainly haven't been offered 'the lubrication!!'

Talking of the organ - I often think of sitting, as a child, in Cockpen Church with the Sunday School and seeing smoke appear from the right side of the organ casing (where it was, and still can be, pumped by hand) and wondering why that was - never giving a thought that the Church might be on fire!!

Later in life I learned that the cause was - the boy(s) who were employed to 'blow' the organ were having a 'fly puff' on their cigarette during the Sermon.

If you get the chance, ask Graham or Andrew Jack to let you see where the organ lever is - it is interesting, if not a little cramped to see the 'workings' and, various initials of those who 'blew' the organ so long ago.

Although it might seem early to be doing this I am casting a look at some material that could be used by the choir during the Advent/Christmas Season and we shall probably start work on this in the autumn. Periodically I put out an invitation to anyone who would like to augment the choir for a limited period, such as Christmas, to come and join us – you would be made most welcome. Our regular choir work very hard and are very good and in recent years they have been well supported by five friends from the congregation who have come with their musical talents. However with larger numbers one could try pieces which give emphasis to the different voice parts. If anyone would like to join us please have a word with me either in church or telephone me on 663 8895.

In recent months I have read Aled Jones' book "Forty Favourite Hymns" which tells the stories behind his favourite forty hymns. Included is "Mine eyes have seen the glory of the coming of the Lord", written by Julia Ward Howe and sung to the tune "Battle Hymn of the Republic" by William Steffe. The version which we use in CH4 omits two verses which Julia Ward Howe wrote in her true "battle hymn" and you might be interested in the words:

I have seen Him in the watch-fires of a hundred circling camps, They have builded Him an altar in the evening dews and damps; I can read His righteous sentence by the dim and flaring lamps: His day is marching on.

I have read a fiery gospel writ in burnished rows of steel: "As ye deal with my condemners, so with you my grace shall deal; Let the Hero, born of woman, crush the serpent with his heel, Since God is marching on".

I don't think our children know what an apron is.

The principal use of Grandma's apron was to protect the dress underneath because she only had a few. It was easier to wash aprons than dresses and they used less material, but along with that, it served as a potholder for removing hot pans from the oven.

It was wonderful for drying children's tears and, on occasions, was even used for cleaning dirty ears.

From the chicken coop the apron was used for carrying eggs, fussy chicks, and sometimes half-hatched eggs to be finished in the warming oven. When company came those aprons were ideal hiding places for shy children. And when the weather was cold grandma wrapped it around her arms.

Those big old aprons wiped many a perspiring brow bent over the hot stove. Kindling wood was brought into the kitchen in that apron. From the garden it carried all sorts of vegetables. After the peas had been shelled it carried out the hulls. In autumn the apron was used to bring in apples that had fallen from the trees. When unexpected company drove up the road, it was surprising how much furniture that old apron could dust in a matter of seconds.

When dinner was ready, grandma walked outside, waved her apron and the men knew it was time to come in from the fields to dinner. It will be a long time before someone invents something that will replace the 'old-time apron' that served so many purposes.

Mr. Campbell was a true historian in many ways and he has made many contributions, both written and spoken, about the history of Lasswade, Lasswade Church and especially the windows. The other founding member of the Local History Society was Dr. Mary Noble who was an expert in the field of seed pathology as well as being interested in local history, Beatrix Potter and the Royal and Ancient Game. Strangely, Dr. Noble and Mr. Campbell died within weeks of each other in 2002.

Local History - Part 2

Subscribers to Life & Work may have read "Winning Religious Freedom" written by Professor Peter Howie in the May Issue. This article, which was the last one in a series of pen portraits about the Reformation, featured James Renwick, the Last Martyr.

James Renwick was born in 1662 in the middle of a tumultuous century as far as religious fervour was concerned. James V1 of Scotland succeeded Queen Elizabeth in 1603 and went south where, as James 1, he became king of Great Britain, One of James' intentions was to standardise church worship throughout England and Scotland. This policy was continued by his son, Charles I, who went a step or two further by introducing the Liturgy, the Prayer Book and appointing bishops, all without consulting with the relevant authorities in Scotland. The Four Tables, representing Noblemen, Burgesses, Lairds and Ministers, petitioned the King to withdraw the Liturgy. The King refused and threatened the Tables with treason. This reaction provided the fuel to draw up The National Covenant, modelled on God's Covenant with the Children of Israel, and this was signed in Grevfriars Kirk on 28th February 1638, with copies sent throughout Scotland for people to sign if they were in sympathy with the aims of the Covenant. Very simply, by signing the document, the Covenanters recognised the King as head of state but not as head of the Church. The Scots wanted freedom to worship in their own way and to pursue the Presbyterian form of government. If people had adhered to the aims of the Covenant the religious wars which followed might have been avoided, but, "there's none as queer as folk"!

Charles II was restored to the throne in 1660 and while he released the country from the grip of Puritanism he was opposed to Presbyterianism. He, like his father and grandfather, saw himself as Head of the Church and wished all ministers to take an oath recognising this. A large number of ministers did not conform because they adhered to the principles of the Covenant and, risking everything for their religious freedom, they left their churches and manses, and taking their congregations with them, headed for the hills where conventicles were held. The authorities became alarmed at these gatherings and a period of persecution followed until 1688. James VII and II, who had retained his allegiance to Catholicism, fled the country in 1689. The Stuart Dynasty had ended and Presbyterianism was soon by law established.

When he was 19, James Renwick heard a noted Covenanting Minister, Donald Cargill, declare his faith before his execution. James Renwick decided then to follow the Covenanting cause and went to Holland to train as a minister, returning to Scotland as the killing times were at their height. He travelled widely throughout Scotland and became the Covenanters' new leader. Men and women put themselves at risk by giving Mr. Renwick clean clothes and food. Constantly on the move he avoided capture until he was spotted by a soldier in Edinburgh and arrested. He was executed in the Grassmarket in 1688.

Lasswade Church has a connection with James Renwick in the Umpherston Memorial Window on the north wall, gifted by Lady Aitchison in 1898. The Umpherstons remembered here are believed to be the descendants of the old Pentland family who received James Renwick's body and prepared it for burial.

The Cockpen Pulpit Bible (MDCLXXII)

In Cockpen & Carrington Parish Church we are fortunate to have in our possession the 'old' Cockpen Pulpit Bible. This Bible, printed in 1672, was in weekly use in Cockpen Church up to 1820, when the then Church building was closed for public worship. It is interesting to note that the first Minister at Cockpen, after the Reformation, was William Knox, who was the brother of the great Scottish Reformer, John Knox.

The first service of public worship in our present Church building was held on 2nd April 1820, and to coincide with this a new Pulpit Bible was introduced. Although no longer in use, this Bible too is held for safekeeping.

For those new to the area, the 'old' Cockpen Church is located just beyond Dalhousie Castle, heading towards Gorebridge. Given its age (circa 12th century) this building, thanks to restoration work carried out a number of years ago, is in remarkably good condition and I would recommend well worth a visit.

It is amazing to think that, after all this time, we still have in our possession this 338 year old Pulpit Bible. To get the context of this time span into some sort of perspective, the Bible was printed 73 years before the 1745 2nd Jacobite Rebellion, 87 years before the birth of Robert Burns, and 267 years before the outbreak of the 2nd World War!

Out of interest a neighbour who had an antiquarian bookshop had a look at it and I inquired given its age, if it would have any current day value. I was informed that as there were still many Bibles of this vintage around, and even earlier, its value would be limited. However, we agreed that as far as the Church was concerned its value was priceless and should be safely guarded for future generations.

Within the flysheet of the New Testament section of the Bible are set out the following handwritten notes:

(This Bible was left to the Parish of Cockpen by the Reverend Mr David Lindsay, who had been Minister there from the year 1695 to the year 1745- when he died).

(Mr John Bonar was ordained Minister at Cockpen August 22, 1746. Transported to Perth July 29th 1756).

(The Rev Mr William Gloag was ordained Minister at Cockpen Apr 28th 1758. Transported to Edin. Oct 22nd 1767).

(Mr James Steele was ordained Minister at Cockpen 28th Sept 1768 and accepted Benefice in Jamaica in May 1782).

(The Rev Ebenezer Marshal was settled as Minister at Cockpen in January 1783 and died there in May 1813 after having completed the thirtieth year of his Ministry in that Parish).

Given the age of the Bible I am sure that it will not come as a surprise to read that a certain amount of restoration work is required. The good news is that the Kirk Session is looking into the possibility of having the Bible sympathetically restored, and if successful it is planned to have it placed permanently in the Church for all to view, appreciate and enjoy.

Cockpen Pulpit Bible (MDCLXX II) (Continued)

In addition to all of this, the history of the Cockpen Pulpit Bible took another fascinating turn as found within its pages was a letter dated 2 November 1895 (envelope, Post Office marks and letter in good condition), and the contents of this 115-year-old letter are reproduced below:

Lundin Links Largo, Fife. 2nd November 1895

The Session Clerk Cockpen

Dear Sir.

At the sale of the effects of the late Dr. Davidson, Minister of Largo, and formerly Minister of Cockpen, what seems to have been the pulpit Bible of Cockpen for upwards of a hundred years was purchased. It wants the flyleaf and the title page at the beginning, but at the beginning of the New Testament portion it is stated that the Bible was left to the Parish of Cockpen by the Rev. Mr David Lindsay who had been minister of the Parish from 1695 to 1745. The names of the 4 other ministers with dates of their ordination are also written on the same page and another.

The Bible was printed in 1672.

If the Kirk Session of Cockpen care to have the Bible, I shall be glad to send it to you or to the Minister. It might come by parcel post, or by rail. I do not ask anything for it, but the purchaser is a poor man, and he voluntarily came to me with it and asked me to write to you if you wished to have it. I do not think he expects anything for it; but if it is of any value to you as a relic of bygone times, you might take that into consideration when you see it.


